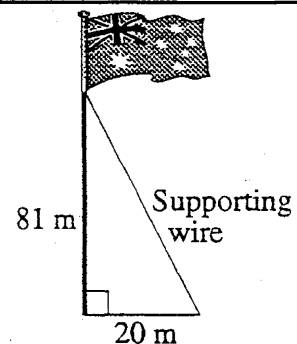

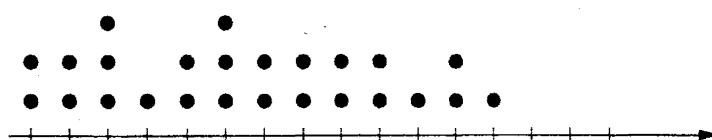

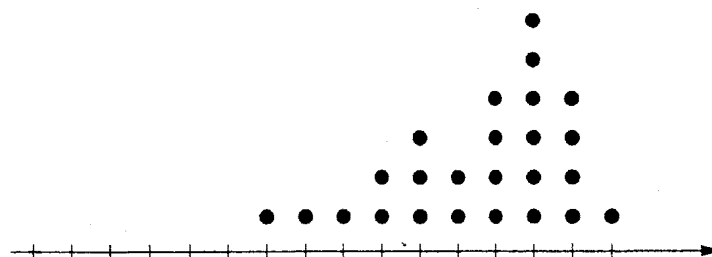

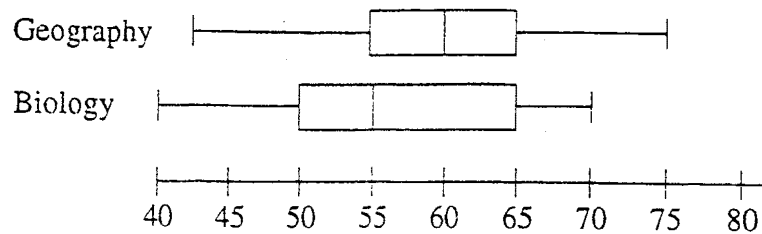

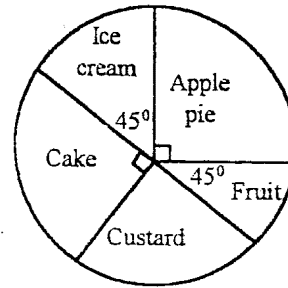

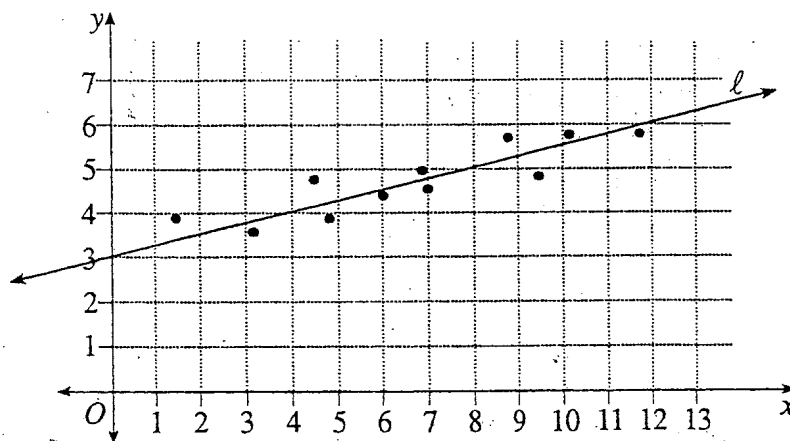

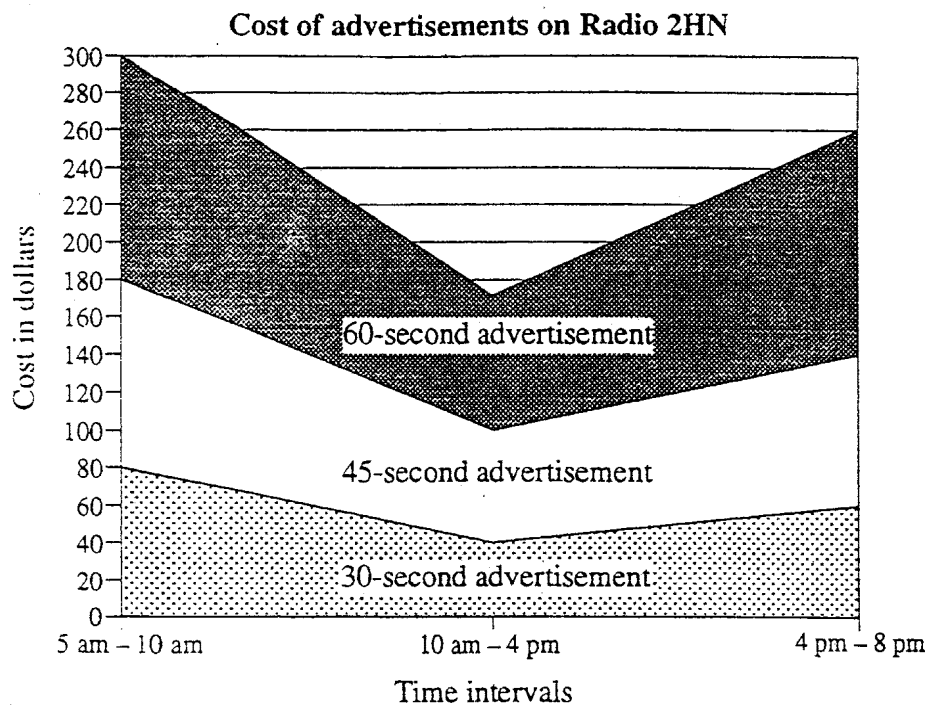

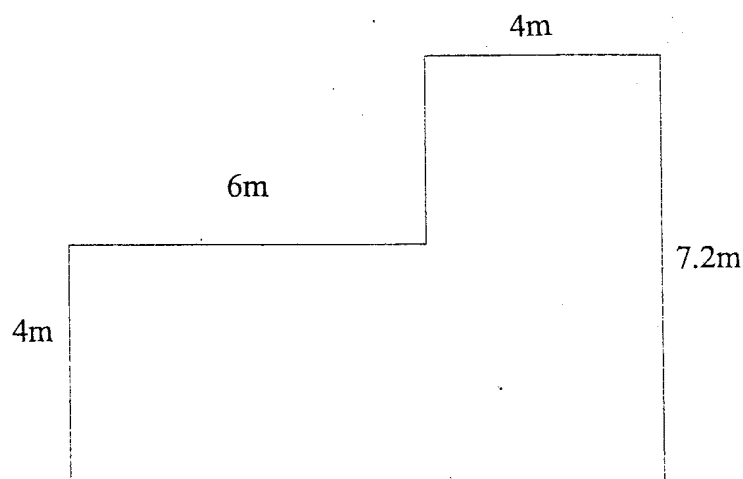

- d) Mrs Swan needs to give her daughter some medicine. Her daughter is 7 years old and weighs 22.5 kg. She is using the rule 3
- $$D = \frac{kA}{70}$$
- (where k is the mass of the child in kilograms and A is the adult dosage) to calculate the dose of medicine for her daughter. The adult dosage is 12 mL every morning and 12 mL every night.
- How many days will a 375 mL bottle of this medicine last her daughter?

$$D = \frac{kA}{70} \text{ (where } k \text{ is the mass of the child in kilograms and } A \text{ is the adult dosage)}$$
